# Introduction to the 'Nahw' science

## **Definition**:

*Nahw* is the regulations which decide how the Arabic sentence must be formed from words, and how their endings must be regarding *i'rab* and *bina'*. *Nahw* consists of two rules:

# A) Forming rules:

The rules which decide how the sentence is formed and the peculiarities of its parts, such as definiteness or indefiniteness, precession or subsequence and so on.

## B) The I'rab (ending) rules:

The rules which decide the ending of the *mu'rab* (words which their endings change) words, such as the subject being nominative and the object being accusative.

## Subject:

The subject of Nahw is the words and sentences.

## Usage:

A. Ability to form correct Arabic sentences

B. Ability of understanding them

A mistake in forming the sentence will make it useless, such as bringing a verb without subject, and a mistake in the ending of the parts of the sentence will denote the contrary of the intended meaning.
